2) Confirmation of the minutes of the 80th Annual General Meeting

a) Corrections, Proposer and Seconder approval

The Minutes of the 80th Annual General meeting were proposed by Marthinus Potgieter and seconded by Walter Doubell.

b) Matters arising from previous minutes

The Appointment of Treasurer - Post 2021 AGM Iaan Myburgh appointed as Treasurer Elected Officer Appointment - Mr Walter Doubell was appointed as an Elected Officer

3) Chairman's Report

This past year after the disaster of 2020, was supposed to be a year of recovery, growth and revitalisation, little did we know that two further lockdowns later and into a 4th wave that 2021 has not turned out to these expectations. The overall industry remains depressed, with many knee-jerk reactions to varied restrictions world-wide, although in some quarters sanity is starting to prevail, as the industry is looking at operating despite the pandemic's continued unpredictability.

Recreational Aviation had at least seen resurgence in activity in-between the lockdown levels, and many events were able to take place, notably the Aero Club Airweek in April, which at last could celebrate our Centenary in style a year later, and most sections could hold their regional / local competitions in their disciplines.

Air shows however, had to forfeit any plans for events for a 2nd year running given the restrictions on public gatherings, although a bumper show schedule is planned for 2022. The World Rally Flying Championships had to be cancelled for a 2nd year in a row, fortunately enough foresight in July of the potential risk of the 4th wave hitting the world in November saw the decision to at least save the day, given the flight cancellations and border closures to SA that occurred.

2021 has also been a sad year in the loss of well-known Aviators, and we unfortunately had to say farewell to Mark Stoxreiter and the team on the Netcare Bell 430, Des Barker, Rama Iyer, Essie Esterhuysen, Neville Ferreira, and most recently Glen Warden in Aviation related accidents. We will remember them.

This past year has also seen the Aero Club gain further traction with CAA interaction on Advocacy topics, notably ATF renewals which has seen a good improvement in turnaround times, although we are still working improving tis further, especially that the CAA upholds their 20 day SLA (Service



Level Agreement) time lines. We are also collaborating on the rewrite of the Approved Persons regulation Part 66.4, with good progress being made. Members have been kept informed with regular mailchimps throughout the year of our interactions with the CAA from our GA/RA Industry Liaison forums.

We will continue to take concerted efforts to ensure Recreational Aviation is embraced by you the Recreational Aviator and supported by the Regulator to uphold our charter of ensuring Freedom of Flight. Foremost activities include simplifying the ATF renewal process, also rolling out the Aero Club on-line ATF application system, establishing multi-year licencing protocols, and reducing the Service Level turn-around times, amongst others.

Our membership has at least improved slightly since 2020 as recreational aviation activities resumed, however the overall membership of the Aero Club and its constituent Sections has been in decline, we are now under 3000 from a high of 5500 in 2015, which is surely a sign of increasingly tough economic conditions, a turbulent regulatory environment and a few other challenges that we find ourselves in that plays a large part in lessening the recreational participation within the Sections.

This continues to put significant pressure on the Aero Club budget, and we continue to operate without the services of a GM, the workload is shared amongst members with the requisite skills in various advocacy and technical areas co-opted to represent us on the various forums dealing with these matters. Our membership renewal season For 2022 commenced on the 1st of December, we have applied a CPI related increase to the membership fee with a view to ensure affordability going forward.

One of the many benefits of being an Aero Club Member is the third party insurance scheme, as within context of a wide membership base, can enjoy significant discounted premiums especially in the category of aircraft below 600 kg from 25% to 75% depending on aircraft type (see the Aero Club website for details). Similarly with NTCA aircraft above 600 kg and below 2700 kg, there is also an Aero Club beneficiation Third Party Liability Scheme. The premiums in terms of benefit as such far outweigh the membership fees in many cases.

The Aero Club is also still working on Insurance to cover APs, as well as benefits for Aero Club Members on wider Insurance coverage, these will be communicated as they come to hand. The Aero Club has also renewed its Airmeet Third Party Policy, which covers all the events that the Aero Club and its Sections hold throughout the year, which number close to 80 or so events.

The Aero Club is also the National Aero Club (NAC) representing sporting events for competitions held Internationally under the auspices of the FAI, as such is affiliated to SASCOC in governing the conferring of Protea Colours.

Our Centenary celebrations, although muted from the original intentions are largely complete with Airweek 2021 having been successfully concluded, and the Centenary Book published. Given the circumstances, we were able to give our 100 year history the recognition such a milestone deserves. It would have been great to have had a 100 aircraft flypast, possibly still something that can be done at a future date once restrictions are out of the way to at least round off the Centenary.

Our aim continues to focus to make aviation appealing to the recreational aviator and the youth,



in order for them to share and progress in the wonderful passion of all types of aviation sport offered by the various sections of the Aero Club in South Africa, as such we are fortunate to have in our midst many professional and retired professional career and military aviators that continue to share their mentorship and guidance freely to anyone who is interested in aviation in South Africa.

With this, and with 2020/2021 behind us, let us all work together and support the structures that represent recreational aviation to make 2022 a success to achieve growth, as it will only be our coordinated collective efforts that will ensure the survival of our disciplines into the future. SRSA Projects and Funds

No real progress on executing SRSA projects for 2021 and some funds were returned, as well as allocations reverted back to the Aero Club for new applications. The lack of progress stilldue to the fall out of C19 being prevalent in 2021 with no activity in 2020. There is R 152 000 in unspent funds from the 2020/21 year.

A new SRSA application for funds will be launched shortly for the 2023 year.

Membership Support Initiative

The Aero Club instituted this support initiative in 2019 to assist with submissions of ATF and NPL renewals, and was based on a manual administrative process.

Demand for this service has steadily been increasing – 304 ATF renewals were concluded in 2021.

A web-based system (Aero Assist) has been rolled out on 31 Jan 2022 to increase capacity and standardise inputs – 67 ATF applications in the system – 42 issued

The future state is to continue to develop further functionality for NPLs and later CoAs. The Aero Club will share the statistics of the system with the CAA at GA/RA ILF meetings.


Membership

Membership has made a modest recovery post 2020 +/-300 and made the target of 3000 on which the 2021 budget was based.

The Aero Club implemented a multi-section membership fee to provide members with more affordable membership when belonging to multiple sections, with 80% for 2 Sections and 50% for 3 or more Sections. Some improvements to be made to incorporate members having paid sections directly and not via Bluebox.

4) Treasurer's Report

a) Financial Status of the Aero Club of South Africa NPC and associated companies

The Aero Club of South Africa NPC (Registration number 1936/007537/08) Financial Status
For the year ended 31 December 2021

The Aero Club of South Africa's financial statements reflects healthy results for the year ending December 2021.

For the year AeCSA had a surplus of R 517,864 compared to a previous surplus in 2020 of R 120,888.

Income

Total Revenue for the year increased from R1,143,411 in 2020 to R1,320,901 in 2021. This was driven by revenue from membership fees increasing by 21%, primarily through a membership drive during the year.

The annual member subscription fee was R 480 Inc VAT in 2021.

Other income increased from R 217,878 in 2020 to R 463,808 in 2021. The Department Sport and Recreation contribution of R 100,000 reflected for 2021 to the administration of Aero Club. Consulting income, commissions received, and the reversal of capital funds allocated to the Centenary event made up the balance.



Expenses

Total Expenses increased by 4% from R 1,256,760 in 2020 to R 1,309,615 in 2021.

Salaries and wages are the biggest expense at R 507,909 for the calendar year compared to R 491,134 in 2020. The major expenses related to Marketing and Awareness, R 198,750, and FAI membership, R 138,684.

Balance sheet

Cash and cash equivalents reduced from R2,554,916 at 31 December 2020 to R2,368,196 at 31 December 2021.

Retained income increased from R 863,993 to R 1,381,857 at the end of December 2021. The effect of the surplus is recognized in the income statement.

The loans receivable is the advance to The Aero Club Events (Pty) Ltd and loans payable by the end of December are the membership fees due to the sections that were received during December 2021.



b) Financial Status of the Aero Club of South Africa NPC and associated companies

The Aero Club Events of South Africa (Pty) Ltd (Registration number 2012/217049/07) Financial Status
For the year ended 31 December 2021

This company is a private company wholly owned by the Aero Club of SA. This entity was formed to handle all the events of Aero Club.

The primary activity in the company in 2021 relates to the Centenary Celebrations at the Middelburg Air Week held during April 2021.

Income

Income of R 130,910 was recorded for 2021, and was received from the Aero Club of South Africa NPC.

Expenses

Expenses of R 168,313 was recorded for 2021 and relates to activities at the Air Week event.

Summary

The operating loss of R 37,403 was offset by interest received for a recorded loss in 2021 of R 20,009. The loss of R 20,009 in 2021 follows a surplus of R 11,815 in 2020.

No Awards function was held in 2020 or 2021.

d) CAA Interaction

The Aero Club represents its members at a number of Advocacy Forums (+/- 50 per year) - These include Captains of Industry, Industry Liaison Forum (ILF), GA/RA Industry Liaison Forum (GA/RA ILF), CARCom, NASCom, SubComs, Workshops, GASS. These are attended by mainly the Vice Chairman, Chairman and specific Industry Specialists and Council Members.

The prime CAA interface established under the initiative for the Aero Club was the GA/RA ILF, initially an Aero Club meeting with the CAA, later expanded to include wider GA/RA organisations.

Industry interacts with Airworthiness, Personnel Licencing, Operations, GA functions within the CAA with the Executive ASO in attendance. This forum Primarily deals with everything related to GA/RA and the problems noted. Feedback given to Council of discussions and outcomes from the meeting and any actions relevant, as well as sending out communiques to the membership
